



Your local hospitals at Epsom and St Helier aim to provide great care to every patient every day, now and into the future – well beyond 2020.

Our dedicated staff are achieving good results but our buildings are old and becoming an increasing challenge. 43% of them are not suitable to deliver modern healthcare.

We are putting together the case to secure several hundred million pounds of investment to replace them with modern purpose-built facilities so that we can meet your and your family's healthcare needs beyond 2020 and for decades to come. We need your help in choosing where this should be.

In the meantime, we are committed to keeping the full range of services that we provide at both Epsom and St Helier hospitals.

Our challenge... and why we need your help

To make sure we have the best services locally, we plan to develop our local hospitals and provide high-quality buildings so they will meet changing health needs and allow us to continue to provide the care that we believe local people, and our staff, deserve.

We need to make the case for an investment of between £300 and £400 million.

To explain how it will be spent, we have produced a more detailed document based on the views expressed by many hundreds of patients as well as our staff.

It outlines how we think healthcare will be provided in the future and how our plans for the future fit within the regional healthcare strategy for both Surrey and south-west London.

We have heard very clearly that local people want to keep services local, so we are proposing that 85% of our patients will see no change to where they receive their care.

However, we also recognise that we need to build a new specialist facility for our sickest and most at-risk patients (acute patients), where we can deliver services such as major A&E, inpatient beds for children, and births.

This would also make sure we continue to meet the highest-quality standards and operate safely as the demands on us change and increase.

How you can help

Right now, we are at a very early stage and we want your help to shape our proposal about where any new facilities will be built.

We want you to help us shape the plans and, over the page, you'll find more information and details on how to take part.

During the summer we will be meeting as many people and groups as we can to get their views.

This will allow us to put together our case to the NHS. It will set out the possible scenarios and local people's views on them. Sending it to the NHS will begin the process that will formally ask for a detailed review of our need for such a large investment.

The process will take a number of years to be completed, and will include a formal public consultation when we have reached the stage of having recommendations. But at this early stage we would like to get your initial thoughts.

In our outline review of our hospitals, we have looked at six ways we could update and develop our hospitals.

More than 600 local people have already told us what they feel is important in providing hospital services. We now want your views on the potential scenarios. Three of them keep the majority of services local.

In these three scenarios 85% of our services are kept at our two existing hospitals – Epsom and St Helier. They also see the development of new state-of-the-art facilities at a single site.

The main points

All three scenarios mean that 85% of our patients will see no change in how or where they access local hospital services.

We are wanting to secure £300 to £400 million to build a new hospital for our acutely unwell patients on one of our three sites.

Any changes will not happen for a number of years, but we need your involvement now.
